Her deepening relationship with the Augustinian community at Cascia's church of San Francesco placed her at the heart of a reformist movement that challenged clerical complacency and aristocratic excess. The geopolitical context of 15th-century Umbria was critical. The region lay on the fault line between papal Rome and the independent communes, a zone of constant negotiation between spiritual authority and secular power. The papacy, embroiled in the Western Schism (1378-1417), struggled to

assert moral coherence, while local lords wielded private armies and feudal justice. In this climate, Rita's reputation for wisdom and compassion grew organically. Yet, Rita's story is not without controversy. Skeptical historians, including Prof. Marco Bellini of the University of Bologna, have questioned the historicity of certain miracles attributed to her, noting parallels with earlier medieval female saints whose narratives were embellished for hagiographic effect.
