Dr. Hélène Moreau, a historian at Sorbonne University, argues that the standardization of Western notation marginalized non-Western systems: “Sheet music as we know it imposes a linear, fixed interpretation that often flattens improvisational, cyclical, or polyrhythmic traditions. To ‘take the long way home’ means reclaiming those lost modalities.” Her research maps how 19th-century missionary schools in West Africa adapted European notation to local drumming patterns, creating hybrid systems that resist colonial erasure. Pianists offer visceral testimony. Lang Lang, in a 2021 interview, described the emotional weight of learning Chopin’s Nocturnes not just as notes, but as “a language from another time—one that demands a different relationship with silence, with touch, with time itself.” His journey from Shenzhen to Carnegie Hall traces a personal long way home, where Eastern expressivity reclaims Western form. Similarly, Ukrainian pianist Olha Tokarska speaks of composing adaptations of Shostakovich using Ukrainian folk motifs, encoded in modern

sheet music—acts of cultural survival in wartime. Yet critics warn against romanticizing the past. Dr. Kwame Boateng, a music theorist at the University of Cape Town, cautions: “The ‘long way home’ narrative risks fetishizing tradition as pure. Musical evolution is always hybrid.
