Recorded at London's Record Plant, Hendrix's use of feedback, distortion, and extended guitar solos transformed the instrument into a voice of psychedelic transcendence. His performances at the Isle of Wight Festival (1968) and Monterey Pop (1967) were not concerts but rituals—spaces where rock transcended entertainment to become spiritual and political. The era's economic context is critical: the expansion of vinyl

records, the rise of independent labels, and the global distribution networks enabled rock to bypass traditional gatekeepers. Yet this democratization carried risks. The commercialization of rebellion led to homogenization—sanitized versions of rock that diluted its radical edge.
