The Pentagon Papers (1971), revealed by Daniel Ellsberg, and the Iran-Contra scandal (1980s) laid bare how national security could mask criminality and moral evasion. Investigative journalists, armed with leaked documents and whistleblowers, became frontline agents in this unseen battle, attempting to "capture" not just individuals but the mechanisms of deniability that shielded them. The evolution accelerated in the digital age, where data, encryption, and globalized finance transformed both the opportunities and risks. The rise of offshore financial centers—Cayman Islands, Luxembourg, Singapore—created a labyrinthine architecture for laundering money, evading taxes, and hiding ownership. This enabled not just white-collar crime, but the financing of authoritarian regimes, terrorism, and cyberwarfare.
