Investment in climate-resilient agriculture—drought-tolerant crops, agroforestry—must prioritize smallholders. Hydropower development requires rigorous environmental impact assessments and inclusive governance. Projections from the IPCC and regional climate models confirm worsening extremes. By 2050, the Himalayas could see a 20–30% reduction in snowpack and a 10–20% increase in monsoon rainfall variability.
