In urban centers like London, Paris, and Berlin, occupational health records from the 1850s onward reveal clusters of chronic poisoning among ink-makers and typographers, often misdiagnosed as consumption or nervous disorders. Controversies emerged as awareness grew. In 1870s Britain, the Parliamentary Select Committee on Ink Toxicity investigated reports of clerk deaths linked to long-term exposure. Testimonies revealed that even low-dose, chronic inhalation led to severe dermatological conditions and organ damage, yet official responses remained tepid. The chemical industry, driven by profit and limited regulation, dismissed early epidemiological data as anecdotal. It was not until pathological studies by Rudolf Virchow and others linked arsenic to specific cellular damage—particularly in the skin and kidneys—that public pressure mounted. The 1906 Pure Food and Drugs Act in the United States, though focused on consumables, reflected a broader shift toward chemical accountability, indirectly pressuring industries using arsenic in non-food contexts, including writing materials. In contrast, Russian and Austro-Hungarian empires, with extensive industrial infrastructure, saw widespread use of arsenic-laced inks in land records and military correspondence, contributing to higher documented mortality among scribes. In China, despite the coexistence of classical calligraphy and early modern printing, arsenic in writing materials remained marginal until the 20th century, preserved more in folk traditions than in state archives. The linguistic dimension further deepens the narrative. Old lace script, with its intricate flourishes, often concealed subtle flaws—pauses, smudges, or uneven ink distribution—features that, under modern scrutiny, reveal microscopic traces of arsenic. Forensic document analysts now employ techniques like X-ray fluorescence (XRF) spectroscopy and laser-induced breakdown spectroscopy (LIBS) to map elemental composition in historical manuscripts. These tools have uncovered arsenic hotspots in 19th-century correspondence from the Ottoman Empire, British India, and the American South, where plantation records and legal deeds were frequently written with contaminated inks. Cultural memory of arsenic in writing lingers in literature and folklore. The “greenish tinge” of old parchment or the faint metallic aftertaste when handling antique letters are not mere sensory quirks but echoes
