Their indifference to suffering—whether Gatsby's death or Myrtle's—exposes the moral bankruptcy of a system that privileges lineage and appearance over integrity. The economic context of the 1920s was pivotal. The decade saw unprecedented industrial growth, mass production, and a stock market boom driven by speculative lending and consumer credit. Yet beneath the surface, cracks formed: wage stagnation for the working class, labor unrest, and an unsustainable dependency on debt. Gatsby's extravagant parties, where people drink, dance, and consume not out of joy but to signal belonging, reflect this social fever dream. The novel's famous line—"So we beat on, boats against the current"—is not merely poetic resignation but a stark acknowledgment of systemic inertia. From a geopolitical standpoint, the *Great Gatsby* narrative functions as a universal parable about aspiration under inequality. While rooted in American history, its themes resonate globally. The novel's enduring power lies in its abstraction: Gatsby is not just a 1920s billionaire, but every individual who believes wealth and status can rewrite their identity. In an age of social media personas, influencer economies, and the global spectacle of wealth (from Dubai towers to Manhattan penthouses), Fitzgerald's question—Can you truly become who you want, or are you trapped by the face society demands?—is more urgent than ever. In film, **The Great Gatsby** has inspired multiple adaptations—from Baz Luhrmann's exuberant 2013 version to recent streaming explorations—each refracting the story through contemporary anxieties about fame, authenticity, and alienation. In fashion, Gatsby's aesthetic—gold lamé, art deco, opulent excess—has repeatedly resurfaced, symbolizing not just nostalgia but the cyclical nature of trend-driven identity. Tech and finance, particularly in Silicon Valley, have embraced the Gatsby archetype: the self-made disruptor, the billionaire visionary, the founder whose myth eclipses the reality of labor and risk. Yet this cult of the "visionary" often masks the same contradictions: innovation funded by venture capital, success built on disruption yet insulated by privilege. Expert perspectives further deepen the analysis. Sociologist Zygmunt Bauman, in **Liquid Modernity**, echoes Gatsby's existential vertigo, arguing that contemporary identity is increasingly defined by transient aspirations and the fear of being permanently obsolete. Psychologist Jean Twenge identifies a generational shift toward "Financial Optimism" in millennials and Gen Z—despite economic precarity—mirroring Gatsby's belief in the dream's accessibility. Meanwhile, economist Mariana Mazzucato critiques the "value gap" between perceived merit and systemic enablers, arguing that modern wealth creation often depends on public infrastructure, regulation, and social investment—echoing Fitzgerald's subtle indictment of individualism. Long-term implications suggest a bifurcation: on one hand, a growing class of "performative achievers" who curate success for public consumption; on the other, a rising underclass grappling with existential uncertainty. The novel's warning—that the dream becomes a prison when it replaces purpose—is prescient. As automation and AI redefine work, the Gatsby question evolves: if meritocracy collapses under algorithmic determinism, what becomes of identity? Can purpose be sustained in a world where status is algorithmically assigned? Forward-looking projections point to a cultural reckoning. Movements emphasizing authenticity, mental health, and community over individualism may signal a shift away from Gatsby's seductive illusion. Yet the narrative's endurance suggests deeper forces at play. The dream persists because it speaks to a fundamental human drive: the need to believe in transformation. The challenge lies in redefining that transformation—not as ascent into a rarefied elite, but as collective advancement rooted in equity, sustainability, and shared dignity. Strategically, institutions must confront the myths that sustain inequality. Education must teach critical literacy—not just reading texts, but dissecting the systems that produce them. Economists and policymakers should measure progress beyond GDP, incorporating well-being, inclusion, and intergenerational justice. Media and art, from Fitzgerald's legacy, must resist romanticizing excess and instead illuminate the hidden costs of aspiration. In the quiet after Gatsby's gunshot, the green light remains not just a symbol, but a question: What are we chasing? In a world where data fuels identity, algorithms shape desire, and wealth is both currency and cage, the Great Gatsby questions endure. They are not answers, but invitations—to reflect, to resist, to reimagine. For in the end, the dream may not be in the light, but in the courage to ask what we've built in its glow.

Origins: The Roaring Twenties and Fitzgerald's Personal Crucible

The Great Gatsby emerged from a specific historical nexus: the post-World War I United States, a nation reeling from global upheaval yet radiating economic exuberance.
