Initially, it operated as a private charity, but its proximity to the mines ensured a steady intake—children of miners who perished in fatal accidents or succumbed to silicosis and lead poisoning. By 1878, the orphanage had expanded into a purpose-built complex with dormitories, an infirmary, and a school, overseen by the Sisters of St. Clare, a Catholic order with ties to New York’s charitable elite.
