Workers were portrayed not as laborers in revolt, but as essential pillars of national infrastructure. The campaign succeeded in turning public sentiment against violent labor confrontation, illustrating how PR could transform social conflict into managed discourse. This era established a duality that endures: PR as both a democratic tool for clarity and a strategic instrument of control. As the Great Depression deepened, governments and corporations alike turned to PR not just to inform, but to stabilize—a precedent that would expand exponentially in the decades to come.

World War II and the Weaponization of Narrative

The Second World War catalyzed public relations from a corporate and statecraft tool into a central instrument of total war. With entire populations mobilized, governments understood that battlefield victory required not only military might but also the hearts and minds of domestic and international audiences. The U.S. Office of War Information (OWI), established in 1942, became the prototype of modern state-driven PR. Led by Elmer Davis, the OWI fused journalism, film, radio, and propaganda into

a unified narrative machine. Its campaigns—from “Loose Lips Sink Ships” to the iconic “We Can Do It!” poster—were not mere slogans but psychological architectures designed to sustain morale, demonize the enemy, and unify a fractured society. The U.S. Information Agency (USIA), founded in 1953, institutionalized cultural diplomacy, using television, exhibitions, and radio broadcasts—most famously Voice of America—to project American ideals abroad. Simultaneously, Soviet campaigns leveraged mass rallies and ideological framing to sustain legitimacy. The era marked the professionalization of PR as a geopolitical instrument, where soft power became as critical as military strength. However, the Vietnam War exposed the limits of narrative control. Virtual and augmented reality offer new frontiers for experiential storytelling—immersive campaigns that simulate impact, foster empathy, and build emotional connection.
