Conversely, in Singapore—renowned for its high-achieving but competitive system—tracing is embedded in after-school “literacy labs,” where AI analyzes stroke pressure and spatial alignment, feeding data into personalized learning plans. This model correlates with strong PISA scores but also with elevated anxiety among young learners, prompting calls for balanced approaches.

Controversies and Risks: Equity, Privacy, and the Surveillance Gaze

The rise of digital tracing platforms has exposed critical vulnerabilities.
