This triadic framework, framed as a crisis of duty and identity, transcends its battlefield setting to address universal human dilemmas—doubt, responsibility, and the nature of self. Yet, the Gita's reception outside India has long been mediated by colonial and postcolonial dynamics. The British Raj, with its Orientalist scholarship, often reduced the text to a devotional manual, stripping it of its philosophical complexity. Translation choices—often favoring devotional over analytical rendering—reinforced this simplification. It was not until the mid-20th century, amid decolonization and the rise of comparative religion, that scholars like Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan and later Wendy Doniger recontextualized the Gita as a dynamic philosophical dialogue. Still, Western engagement remained fragmented, oscillating between mysticism, political ideology, and psychological interpretation. Barbara Miller entered this terrain in the 1980s, a period marked by growing Western interest in Eastern spirituality, catalyzed by countercultural movements, the rise of transpersonal psychology, and academic re-evaluations of non-Western epistemologies. As a senior investigative journalist and long-form analyst, Miller rejected reductive syntheses. Her work was not about exporting the Gita as a self-help guide but about excavating its structural coherence, ethical depth, and geopolitical relevance. In the 1990s and 2000s, as neoliberal capitalism intensified individual alienation, her insistence on collective responsibility and ethical action gained renewed urgency. She positioned the Gita as a counter-narrative to both authoritarian nationalism and hyper-individualism, advocating for a “dharma-centered” global citizenship. Her work was cited in policy circles discussing resilience in post-conflict societies, particularly in South Asia, where civil wars and communal tensions demanded frameworks for reconciliation. Economically, Miller’s influence permeated the burgeoning spiritual publishing industry. Yet Miller’s work was not without controversy. Some traditionalist Hindus critiqued her interpretive liberties, accusing her of “Westernizing” a sacred text. Others, particularly in American academic circles, questioned her integration of psychoanalysis, arguing it introduced foreign theoretical biases. But her defenders—including postcolonial theorists and comparative religion experts—pointed to her methodological transparency: she clearly delineated her interpretive frameworks, acknowledging both fidelity to tradition and critical distance. This nuanced stance allowed her to navigate competing epistemologies without sacrificing depth. From an industry perspective, Miller’s legacy lies in reshaping how sacred texts are marketed and consumed. The rise of podcasts, digital courses, and multimedia storytelling—epitomized by platforms like Insight Timer and The Gita Project—owes much to her insistence on accessibility without dilution. Her narrative-driven approach enabled creators to embed philosophical content within compelling human stories, making ancient wisdom relevant to millennial and Gen Z audiences. Brands and NGOs began integrating Gita-inspired narratives into campaigns on leadership, mental health, and environmental ethics—using her insights to build culturally resonant messaging. Globally, Miller’s interpretation sparked comparisons with other spiritual canons. Scholars noted parallels between the Gita’s karma yoga and Stoic resilience, or its dharma with Confucian filial duty, yet emphasized the Gita’s unique synthesis of cosmology and ethics. In Japan, her work was studied alongside Zen koans for its meditative structure; in Africa, its emphasis on communal duty resonated with Ubuntu philosophy. These cross-cultural dialogues underscored the Gita’s adaptability—not as a dogma, but as a dynamic framework for ethical reasoning. Looking forward, Miller’s insights hold profound implications. As artificial intelligence and automation redefine work and identity, her emphasis on intentional action—“karma without ego”—offers a counterbalance to algorithmic

determinism. In climate crisis discourse, her vision of svadharma as ecological responsibility—duty to one’s place, one’s community—provides a moral foundation for localized, ethical action. Her work anticipates a future where spiritual wisdom is not sidelined by technocratic progress but integrated into systemic transformation. Miller’s unpublished archives reveal unfinished projects: a comparative study of the Gita with the Upanishads on consciousness, and a documentary series exploring its performance traditions across Southeast Asia. These projects, though incomplete, signal an evolving commitment to immersive, interdisciplinary inquiry. Her final public lecture, “The Gita in the Age of Entropy,” concluded that wisdom lies not in answers but in the courage to ask the right questions—a principle increasingly vital in an era of information overload and existential uncertainty. In sum, Barbara Miller redefined the Bhagavad Gita not as a relic but as a living dialogue, its ancient voices speaking urgently to modern crises. Her work exemplifies the power of investigative journalism and long-form analysis to bridge civilizations, challenge reductive narratives, and restore depth to global discourse. In an age of fragmentation, her interpretation reminds us that the Gita’s greatest teaching may be its own: that meaning is not found in certainty, but in the persistent, courageous effort to live with integrity.
