Saudi Arabia, while not offering naturalization to non-Muslims, grants limited residency permits with no path to citizenship, reflecting a state defined by religious and tribal identity. South Korea's 2008 reform, opening citizenship to children of foreigners born in Korea, marked a historic pivot—yet bureaucratic hurdles and societal resistance persist. Only 3% of the population now holds naturalized citizenship, despite 1.5 million foreign residents. These comparisons reveal a spectrum: from inclusive, merit-based systems to ethnocentric exclusivity. Estonia's e-residency, though not citizenship, demonstrates how digital governance can expand access and transparency—potential models for inclusive naturalization. Yet risks persist. Automation and AI may deepen inequality, leaving vulnerable populations behind. Without deliberate inclusion, naturalization risks becoming a tool of elite selection rather than mass integration.
