In Philadelphia, the innovation economy thrives in the University City district, where Penn's Pennovation Works incubates ventures in medtech, agritech, and climate resilience. The city's \$1.2 billion Life Sciences Corridor—anchored by Penn, Jefferson Health, and the Wistar Institute—has attracted over 40 biotech firms since 2015, creating 18,000 high-skill jobs. Yet, the transition is uneven. In Appalachian Pennsylvania—home to coal-dependent communities—entrepreneurship remains constrained by infrastructure gaps and limited venture capital access. However, initiatives like the Appalachian Regional Commission's business grants and the Pennsylvania Economic Development Corporation's Clean Energy Accelerator are fostering localized innovation in energy storage, rural broadband, and sustainable agriculture.
