While the United States dominates true serial killer lore, the phenomenon is not exclusive to the West. In Japan, figures like Tsutomu Miyazaki—known as the “Little Girl Murderer”—exposed societal discomfort with childhood trauma and media silence. In Brazil, the killings of child victims by serial offender Paulo César Mendes revealed systemic neglect in marginalized urban zones. In Eastern Europe, post-Soviet collapse created conditions where disaffected youth, often with histories of state abuse, turned to violence. In authoritarian states, serial killings are frequently suppressed or distorted. In China, for example, state-controlled narratives often sanitize or exaggerate crimes to maintain social stability. In Russia, the legacy of Soviet-era trauma and contemporary repression fosters a culture where violence against the vulnerable goes unreported. Even in democratic nations, political rhetoric that dehumanizes marginalized groups can normalize cruelty, creating a permissive environment for extremism. The global pattern suggests a recurring theme: serial killing thrives where social safety nets fail, where silence is enforced, and where the individual is alienated from collective responsibility. It is not a cultural universal, but a symptom of systemic fragility.
