Yet colonialism also entailed violence: forced labor, religious suppression, and demographic collapse. The 1680 Revolt was not merely a military campaign but a theological and cultural reclamation, where Pueblo leaders revived pre-colonial rituals and expelled Spanish symbols, asserting spiritual and territorial autonomy.

In the 19th century, New Mexico's geopolitical liminality intensified. As part of Santa Fe de Nuevo México, it was a contested frontier between Spanish Empire, Mexican republic, and independent Indigenous polities. The 1846-1848
