Arid, low-humidity environments slowed microbial decay, preserving organic material far longer than in humid coastal zones. This allowed for more thorough scientific study—tissue sampling, DNA analysis, and stable isotope tracking—before decomposition rendered samples unusable. By 2005, private biotech startups and academic consortia began formalizing these practices, establishing mobile labs near known stranding zones in Chubut and Tierra del Fuego. The transition from scavenging to industrial extraction accelerated between 2010 and 2018. Satellite tracking revealed patterns in whale strandings linked to El Niño events and oceanic temperature shifts. Meanwhile, advances in cryopreservation enabled the long-term storage of genetic material. Entrepreneurs, backed by venture capital, framed the hunt as “bioheritage utilization”—harvesting data, not just dead flesh. Mobile units now use drones and thermal imaging to locate carcasses within hours. On-site biorefineries process tissue into powdered extracts, while blockchain systems log every sample for traceability—though enforcement remains weak. What began
