In the Soviet bloc, state-socialist regimes co-opted psychology into Marxist-Leninist frameworks, suppressing psychoanalytic traditions while promoting collectivist models of development. Here, psychology served ideological ends—either as a tool for state management or as a suppressed domain of

individual expression. This ideological polarization shaped global academic trajectories. Western universities, funded by defense and developmental agendas, institutionalized experimental psychology as a tool for optimization and control. In contrast, postcolonial and critical sociologies in the Global South fused Marxist, feminist, and decolonial theories, using sociology to expose structural violence and resist epistemic imperialism.
