However, even in these contexts, gender equity lags: menopause is rarely integrated into national health strategies, and women’s economic participation remains constrained by traditional roles. The pharmaceutical industry has capitalized on this global ambiguity. The menopause market, driven by anti-aging narratives, now exceeds \$100 billion, with projections to double by 2030. Companies like Allergan, Pfizer, and smaller biotechs flood

markets with HRT variants, phytoestrogen supplements, and “bioidentical” formulations—all marketed with varying degrees of regulatory scrutiny. Direct-to-consumer advertising, especially in the U.S. and Brazil, normalizes HRT as a routine intervention, often bypassing nuanced risk-benefit discussions. In emerging economies, weak regulatory frameworks and limited healthcare infrastructure leave millions without access to safe, effective treatments, forcing reliance on unregulated supplements or traditional remedies with uncertain efficacy.

Medical Power, Expert Fractures, and the Crisis of Trust

The medical profession’s handling of menopause has been marked by oscillation between over-medicalization and under-recognition. In the 1990s, HRT was celebrated as a breakthrough; by 2010, it was under intense scrutiny.
