The economic context is critical. The global music education market, valued at over \$14 billion in 2023, increasingly relies on digital platforms that promise efficiency. Publishers and edtech firms profit not just from selling sheets but from capturing user behavior—keystrokes, response times, error patterns—feeding algorithms that personalize content while building proprietary databases.
