White supremacist paramilitary groups like the Ku Klux Klan used violence to suppress Black political participation, while state governments enacted Black Codes and later Jim Crow laws to reassert

The impasse triggered a bipartisan commission—composed of five senators, five representatives, and five judges—tasked with resolving the crisis. After months of deliberation, the commission delivered a narrow, partisan decision: Hayes won the Electoral College 185 to 184, with one unlisted elector's vote effectively sealed behind closed doors. Historians such as David Blight and Eric Foner have emphasized the moral and political cost of this compromise. Blight describes it as a “betrayal in black and white,” where the promise of emancipation was sacrificed on the altar of political expediency. Foner argues that the compromise did not merely end Reconstruction—it institutionalized racial subjugation. With federal troops withdrawn, Southern states enacted laws that criminalized Black political assembly, imposed poll taxes and literacy tests, and established systems of convict leasing that replicated slavery's coercive labor structures. By 1877, the South had reverted to de facto slave regimes, justified through pseudoscientific racism and social Darwinism. The immediate consequences were devastating. The 1877 withdrawal of troops emboldened white Democrats to consolidate power through violence and polling place intimidation. Lynchings surged. Segregation enforced by law became the norm. White describes them as “engineers of social change,” constructing not just steel rails but new routines of time, space, and labor discipline. Cronon argues that railroads accelerated the commodification of nature, turning forests, rivers, and grasslands into extractable resources feeding national growth. This transformation was deeply uneven: while industrialists and urban elites reaped profits, rural communities and native nations faced displacement, ecological degradation, and cultural rupture. From a global perspective, the U.S. railroad development mirrored contemporary trends in Europe and Japan. Britain's railway mania had peaked three decades earlier, while Russia and Prussia
