Expert analysis reveals a fundamental tension at the heart of modern taxation: the trade-off between efficiency and equity. Economists like Thomas Piketty and Emmanuel Saez argue that progressive taxation is not only fair but essential to counteract the self-reinforcing accumulation of wealth, which undermines social mobility and political stability.
