This has spurred calls for ethical engagement: partnerships with source communities, benefit-sharing agreements, and co-creation models that honor originators as knowledge holders, not mere data sources. Yet this risks co-option unless safeguards ensure that core principles of patient-centered care, ecological stewardship, and cultural respect remain intact. This epistemic violence severed knowledge transmission, yet resilience persisted. In remote villages, elders preserved remedies; in diasporic communities, healing traditions survived through oral networks and clandestine practice. By the mid-20th century, decolonization and the rise of alternative medicine movements reignited interest. The 1960s counterculture, with its rejection of institutional authority, created receptive audiences for natural healing. Figures like Herbalist Robert Rickmoore in the U.S. and Ayurvedic physician V. Sivaramakrishnan in India began formalizing practices, publishing texts, and teaching outside academic medicine. These pioneers were not simply reviving the past—they were synthesizing it with emerging fields: psychosomatic medicine, nutritional science, and ecological ethics.

Geopolitical Currents and Economic Structures
