The economic dimension of the narrative is particularly revealing. Verona's economy revolved around trade, agriculture, and artisanal production, but beneath this surface lay deep inequalities. The Prince's veiled presence—"I am a just and powerful sovereign"—echoes the performative sovereignty of early modern rulers who balanced public justice with private manipulation. The tension between public law and private vendetta is crystallized in the tavern scene, where Mercutio's fatalistic contempt for authority—"A plague o' both your houses"—becomes a bitter commentary on the cyclical violence that undermines civic order. From a literary evolution perspective, *Romeo and Juliet* marks a pivotal shift in English drama. Shakespeare departs from the rigid classical unities and moral binaries of earlier morality plays, embracing instead a tragic structure rooted in human fallibility and systemic failure. More recently, adaptations such as *West Side Story* (1961, 2021) transpose the conflict to Harlem, transforming the Montagues and Capulets into rival gangs—a recontextualization that preserves the tragedy's core while exposing its timeless relevance to ethnic and racial strife. The geopolitical implications of the narrative extend beyond the Italian peninsula. The play's themes of divided communities, honor-based violence, and the failure of leadership mirror broader patterns in premodern societies, from the Balkans to the Ottoman Empire. In *Romeo and Juliet*, the city's inability to contain its feuds reflects a recurring historical problem: the collapse of civil order in the absence of effective governance. Shakespeare's Verona thus becomes a microcosm of the fragility of peace in fractured polities—a warning as pertinent today as in Elizabethan England.
