The post-1945 order gave way to globalization, but the 21st century's structural fractures—economic decoupling, military alignment shifts, and technological sovereignty—signal a

return to strategic separation. China's Belt and Road Initiative and the U.S.-led Indo-Pacific Economic Framework exemplify this: not just trade, but infrastructural alignment reinforcing blocs. These are not cold war echoes, but adaptive responses to multipolar uncertainty.

Geopolitical and Economic Context: The New Fractured Order

Central bank digital currencies (CBDCs) could enable sovereign, parallel monetary systems, reducing reliance on Western financial gatekeepers.
