But the crisis was not merely economic. It was existential. For pastoralist communities, the loss of livestock meant not just income, but cultural survival. In the Ogaden, where drought and locusts converged with decades of marginalization, protests erupted—not over locusts, but over the silence of state neglect. West's reporting revealed a deeper pathology: a global food system designed for stability, not disruption. The locusts were not the cause—they were the symptom. argued: “We’ve treated locusts as pests. They’re messengers. The real message is that climate change is rewriting the rules of agriculture, governance, and equity.” Structural reforms—land rights for pastoralists, decentralized early warning systems, climate-adaptive crops—were urgent.
