Global Comparisons: Divergence and Convergence in Liability Frameworks

Meanwhile, in Africa, many jurisdictions rely on adapted versions of colonial-era standards, creating inconsistency and higher audit risk for foreign investors. Emerging economies face a dual challenge: aligning with global norms while addressing local market realities. Nigeria's recent push for mandatory ESG liability disclosures, for instance, mirrors global trends but must contend with limited data availability and enforcement capacity. Brazil's robust but complex tax contingency regime—where pending audits and transfer pricing disputes dominate balance sheets—exemplifies how legal culture shapes liability management.

Forward-Looking Projections and Strategic Implications

Looking ahead, the landscape of current liabilities and contingencies will be reshaped by three macro forces: digital transformation, climate volatility, and regulatory fragmentation. Digital assets and AI-driven business models will introduce new contingent exposures—algorithmic
