Historian Edward Peters argues that reconquista exemplifies “civilizational warfare,” where territorial control is inseparable from ideological dominance. Political theorist Samuel Huntington's controversial “clash of civilizations” framework, though critiqued, finds precedent in reconquista's civilizational binaries. More nuanced scholars emphasize reconquista as a process of “cultural negotiation,” where boundaries were porous and identities fluid—yet the myth of a clear Christian-Muslim divide enabled legitimization of exclusion. Controversies persist. Critics highlight reconquista's role in normalizing ethnic and religious cleansing, drawing parallels to modern ethnic conflicts. The forced conversions, expulsions, and Inquisition are not relics of the past but cautionary tales about the dangers of ideological absolutism. Contemporary debates on multiculturalism, asylum, and religious freedom are refracted through reconquista's legacy, revealing how historical narratives shape present policy. Risks associated with reconquista's revival include the erosion of pluralism and the instrumentalization of history for authoritarian ends. In Hungary, Poland, and parts of Latin America, leaders invoke reconquista-like themes to justify restrictive immigration policies, cultural homogenization, and the suppression of minority rights. Economically, overreliance on extractive frontiers—echoing colonial resource plunder—threatens sustainable development in resource-rich
