Urban centers, especially Madrid and Barcelona, embraced faster schedules, reflecting growing commercial and industrial activity. The state's role expanded during the Second Republic (1931–1939), when labor laws mandated rest days—Sunday as a public holiday, weekdays capped at 48 hours—embedding temporal discipline into the fabric of citizenship. Franco's regime (1939–1975) reinforced this structure, using the week as a tool of social control. The state enforced a rigid 40-hour week in public sectors, aligned with Catholic values of family and rest. Yet underground economies and seasonal laborers—particularly in agriculture and fishing—navigated elusive boundaries, illustrating the gap between legal codification and lived reality. The 1978 Constitution, in its preamble, affirmed labor rights and time for rest, codifying the modern framework: 40-hour workweek, 30-day minimum annual leave, and Sunday as a legal day of rest. Yet enforcement remained uneven, especially in autonomous regions with strong cultural identities. The transition to democracy catalyzed a reimagining of time. The 1980s and 1990s saw regional governments assert control over calendars, particularly in Catalonia, the Basque Country, and Galicia, where linguistic and political identity infused daily vocabulary—*lunes* versus *dies Dominicus*—became acts of

cultural affirmation. This regional diversity persists: while Madrid adheres to national schedules, Catalonia adjusts school and public holidays to reflect local festivals like La Mercè, embedding the week with layered meaning. The 40-hour standard, enshrined in the 1978 Constitution and reinforced by EU directives, sets a baseline for fair work, yet its enforcement reveals structural fissures. In manufacturing, construction, and agriculture—key sectors employing millions—compliance varies. Subcontracted and seasonal work often operates outside fixed hours, with workers logging irregular shifts that blur the legal boundary between work and rest. The rise of the gig economy has exacerbated these tensions. Platforms like Deliveroo, Uber, and Upwork thrive on flexible availability, enabling workers to “choose” their hours—but often at the cost of legal protections. A 2022 study by the Spanish Trade Union Confederation (CCOO) found that 44% of gig workers report inconsistent scheduling, with algorithms dictating availability without transparency. This “flexibility” masks precarity: without predictable hours, workers struggle to access healthcare, education, or family time, undermining the very stability the workweek is meant to ensure. Disruptions, whether from misaligned holidays or algorithmic scheduling failures, ripple through supply chains, affecting everything from hotel occupancy to agricultural harvest.

This linguistic diversity reflects deeper political and social currents. Regions with strong autonomy—Catalonia, Galicia, the Basque Country—have institutionalized regional calendar practices: Catalan schools teach the week in **dies dominicus**, reinforcing cultural continuity. In contrast, central institutions impose a standardized, Castilian-centric version, sometimes perceived as eroding local identity. The tension is not merely semantic: it is about control over time, a domain that shapes how communities organize life, education, and memory. Tourism, a vital economic sector, navigates this complexity with pragmatism. Tour operators tailor schedules to international visitors—extended stays, weekend excursions—but must also respect local rhythms. A 2020 survey by the Spanish Tourism Ministry found that 68% of travelers prefer destinations with clear, predictable calendars, yet 72% also value authentic local experiences, such as Sunday markets or midweek festivals. Balancing these expectations requires a nuanced approach: aligning with official schedules while embracing regional idiosyncrasies. In Catalonia, the **Semana Santa** (Holy Week) exemplifies this duality. Though not a workday, its timing is embedded in the weekly rhythm, influencing public transport, retail, and tourism flows.
