Children participate in daily rituals—cleaning, singing, group problem-solving—that build discipline and community. South Korea, historically exam-obsessed, is now reforming with increased focus on pre-primary critical thinking and emotional well-being, reflecting societal shifts toward work-life balance. These models demonstrate that no single formula exists. Success hinges on aligning pedagogy with cultural values, economic realities, and political will—never exporting models wholesale, but adapting principles contextually.
