The rise of algorithmic trading platforms further complicates the landscape. Robo-advisors now automate currency positions based on macroeconomic signals, sentiment analysis, and machine learning. This shift reduces human discretion but introduces new risks: flash crashes triggered by correlated AI behavior, or systemic feedback loops during crises.

Expert Perspectives: The Dual Nature of Forex as Opportunity and Peril

Economists and market practitioners offer divergent views on forex’s role. Nobel laureate Joseph Stiglitz argues that unregulated forex markets exacerbate inequality, enabling speculative excess while leaving vulnerable economies exposed to destabilizing capital flows. The rise of CBDCs—China's digital yuan, Bahamas' Sand Dollar—signals a potential reconfiguration of forex's foundational infrastructure.

The future of forex is being reshaped by three converging forces: digitization, de-dollarization, and climate-driven risk.
