The young participants—many under 15—were not just reacting to policy; they were enacting a deeper demand: recognition. Their chants, “Wathint’ abafazi, wathint’ umbani!” (“Now strike women, now strike men!”), fused gendered resistance with generational defiance. In the aftermath, as state violence silenced many voices, the script began to take shape.
