Nordic models, combining robust welfare states with participatory governance, exemplify high-capacity empowerment: universal healthcare, free education, and active labor market policies create ecosystems where agency flourishes. In contrast, fragile states in sub-Saharan Africa and parts of Southeast Asia face structural constraints—weak institutions, conflict, debt—limiting empowerment’s reach. Yet even here, innovative local practices persist: community savings groups in Kenya, women’s collectives in Bangladesh, and youth-led tech hubs in Lagos demonstrate adaptive agency under duress. Comparative analysis reveals a global tension: between universalist ideals and context-specific realities. The Global North’s emphasis on individual rights often clashes with collectivist traditions in the Global South, where community-based solidarity systems predate state

institutions. Effective empowerment must honor such diversity, avoiding paternalistic templates. The success of Brazil's Bolsa Família, for instance, lies not in mimicking Northern conditional cash transfers, but in integrating local governance and cultural familiarity. First, deepening democratization of data and decision-making—leveraging digital tools not for surveillance but for inclusive deliberation. Its enduring value lies in its insistence that justice is not granted but co-created, that policy must serve people as subjects, not objects.
