What began as a state crackdown quickly escalated into a brutal urban war. The PLO,

composed of diverse factions including Fatah, PFLP, and PFLP-GC, responded with ambushes, guerrilla tactics, and attacks on military installations. Civilian casualties mounted, and refugee flows surged—particularly toward Lebanon, embedding Palestinian militancy deeper into the Levant. Internationally, the event polarized opinion: Arab nationalist movements hailed Palestinian resistance, while Western powers largely backed Jordan's efforts to restore order, fearing the spread of radicalism. Black September marked a turning point. It exposed the fragility of state authority in post-colonial Arab regimes and catalyzed the radicalization of Palestinian resistance.
