Men specialize in hunting with blowpipes and traps, women in gathering and childcare, while adolescents and elders contribute through knowledge transmission and ritual participation. This egalitarianism, however, existed within a complex cosmology: the forest was not a resource but a living entity, inhabited by spirits and governed by ancestral laws. To hunt was not conquest but negotiation, a ritual act requiring respect, gratitude, and balance.

Turnbull arrived at a pivotal historical juncture. The Congo's independence in 1960 had unleashed a maelstrom of instability—neocolonial interference, resource exploitation, and political fragmentation—all of which seeped into the forest. The Mbuti, though geographically remote, were not insulated. Colonial policies had already disrupted their autonomy, introducing cash economies, Christian missions, and indirect rule that eroded traditional governance. Turnbull documented how the arrival of outsiders—missionaries, state officials, and later industrial loggers—began to fracture the Mbuti's self-sufficiency. Their isolation, once a shield, became a vulnerability as external pressures intensified. Yet Turnbull also observed resilience: their adaptability, deep ecological knowledge, and communal solidarity endured even amid encroachment.
