In Egypt, purple was reserved for the pharaohs, associated with the sun god Ra and the afterlife. Mummies were wrapped in purple-dyed linen, and royal regalia incorporated the hue to signify divine communion. The Roman Empire institutionalized this exclusivity: sumptuary laws under Augustus mandated that only senators, emperors, and certain magistrates could wear *\*toga purpura\**, a garment dyed with imperial authority. The cost was staggering—Pliny the Elder lamented that a single pound of Tyrian purple required the equivalent of ten years' wages for a skilled laborer. This scarcity ensured that purple remained a visual boundary between the ruling elite and the masses, reinforcing social stratification through color. But beyond economics, purple carried metaphysical weight. In Orphic and later Pythagorean traditions, the color was linked to the cosmos—representing the union of earth and sky, mortal and divine.
