A critical feature is its reliance on end-of-course (EOC) tests, which determine high school graduation eligibility. These exams, administered annually, assess mastery in English language arts (ELA) and mathematics—subjects prioritized in statewide curriculum reforms. By tying graduation directly to test performance, the program aims to incentivize rigorous teaching but also raises concerns about test preparation pressures and curriculum narrowing. ###

When used intentionally, Mississippi Academic Assessment Program supports deeper understanding, sustained focus, and a richer, more rewarding learning experience.
