The Restoration and the Glorious Revolution of 1688 marked a decisive shift in literary economics. With the return of the monarchy and the re-establishment of the Church of England, literature re-entered the commercial sphere. The rise of periodicals—pioneered by Addison and Steele in **The Spectator**—created a new literary marketplace, where wit, moral philosophy, and social commentary were packaged for a burgeoning reading public. Daiches traces this evolution with insight, showing how the novel emerged not as a marginal form, but as a direct product of urbanization, rising literacy, and the commodification of leisure. Defoe's **Robinson Crusoe**, often hailed as the first modern novel, is revealed as a cultural artifact of colonial expansion and Enlightenment rationalism—its narrative of self-reliance and survival echoing the ethos of a burgeoning capitalist society. Yet the eighteenth century's literary triumphs were inseparable from empire. literary form to expose the violence beneath civilizing rhetoric.
