These foundational texts reveal how early folktales encoded social hierarchies—evident in the formal **keigo** (honorific speech) used when recounting divine interactions—providing learners with immediate exposure to linguistic registers absent in modern textbooks. But the true transformation of **otogi** occurred during the Edo period (1603–1868), a time of urban flourishing and cultural democratization. Today, as Japan navigates post-industrial identity and demographic decline, folktales remain a strategic asset—both in education and diplomacy.
