The way the needles bend, the scent of pine resin—they teach me what the land needs. We didn't just make baskets. We listened."

Yet scholars caution against romanticization. Dr. Amina El-Fahim, historian of craft and colonialism at SOAS, warns: "The commodification of these baskets risks reducing them to aesthetic objects, severing them from the ethical and ecological frameworks that gave them meaning. Authentic revival must center Indigenous sovereignty, not exoticism."

Controversies, risks, and ecological stakes

Though less documented than their cedar basketry, these forms reveal a pan-Eurasian thread: pine, a resilient and widely available material, became a canvas for cultural expression, adapted to local needs and beliefs. Yet unlike the Northwest Coast, where basketry remains a vibrant, identity-affirming practice, Ainu weaving faced near extinction under assimilation policies—highlighting how political power shapes craft survival.

Long-term implications and forward-looking projections
