The British Empire, for instance, framed its rule as a Christian duty, while colonial powers suppressed indigenous sacred sites under the guise of “civilizing missions.” The 20th century witnessed a paradox: as secular institutions expanded, spiritual longing persisted, often reconfigured. The rise of fundamentalism, Pentecostalism, and global evangelical networks reflected a reactionary reassertion of divine presence in the face of modern disorientation. Simultaneously, liberation theology in Latin America, Black Church activism, and Asian religious movements fused faith with social justice, redefining dwelling in God’s presence as active participation in the struggle for human dignity. Here, the sacred became not only a refuge but a catalyst—God’s presence invoked not in silence but in protest, healing, and communal solidarity. Economically, the sacred has never been marginalized. Religious institutions remain among the largest landowners and service providers globally. The Vatican’s holdings span real estate from Rome to New York; Saudi Arabia’s religious economy is central to its state revenue through pilgrimage and zakat systems. Karen Armstrong’s work on the archaeology of religion underscores that reverence for the sacred is a universal human impulse, adapting across cultures and eras. Meanwhile, sociologists such as Grace Davie and Grace Davie highlight the “believing without belonging” trend—people maintain spiritual frameworks but reject institutional religion, creating new forms of dwelling in the presence of God outside traditional structures. Contemporary movements reflect this evolution. Technological transformation further complicates the equation. Artificial intelligence, virtual reality, and neurotechnology now offer new frontiers for spiritual encounter. VR pilgrimages to Mecca or Jerusalem allow global access to sacred sites, democratizing but also detaching the experience from embodied presence. AI-generated prayers, algorithmic meditation guides, and brainwave-optimized rituals challenge traditional notions of authenticity and revelation. These innovations raise urgent ethical and theological questions: can divine presence be simulated? Does a digital altar hold the same weight as a physical one? And who controls the algorithms shaping spiritual experience? The risks of such shifts are profound. As sacredness becomes programmable, the risk of spiritual consumerism grows—where meaning is curated, optimized, and sold. The erosion of communal ritual weakens the social fabric that once anchored collective dwelling. Moreover, the weaponization of sacred narratives in digital propaganda amplifies polarization, turning spiritual identity into a battleground. Misinformation about divine signs, apocalyptic predictions, and algorithmically amplified extremism threaten to fracture societies rather than unite them in shared reverence. Yet, within this turbulence, enduring patterns persist. The human drive to dwell in God’s presence reflects a fundamental need for continuity, meaning, and connection across generations. This impulse transcends culture and creed, manifesting in diverse forms—from the chanting of Vedic mantras in Himalayan monasteries to the silent contemplation of Quaker meetings, from the Sufi whirling of Turkey to the liturgical chants of Ethiopian Orthodox churches. Each tradition negotiates the sacred through its own historical and cultural lens, yet all affirm a central truth: the divine is not distant but accessible, not

In South Korea, megachurches blend Pentecostal fervor with consumer culture, creating new forms of sacred community. These developments reveal that dwelling in God's presence adapts, resists erosion, and reinvents itself across time and place. Today, the sacred is both under siege and revitalized. Urbanization and digital connectivity fragment traditional communal rituals, yet virtual sanctuaries—online prayer groups, digital pilgrimages, and AI-assisted meditation—expand access. The challenge lies not in preserving static forms but in nurturing dynamic, inclusive spaces where encounter with the divine remains authentic, embodied, and ethically grounded.
