By the 1980s, it had become a touchstone for global feminist movements, cited in UN reports on gender-based violence and referenced in academic curricula from Cairo to Jakarta. Economically, the novel exposes the structural roots of women’s vulnerability. Firdaus’s descent into prostitution is not a moral failing but a survival strategy in a system that denies women access to education, land, or dignified labor. Her entry into the sex trade is framed not as corruption, but as a transactional response to systemic exclusion. El Saadawi, herself a physician and activist, understood that poverty and patriarchy are not separate forces but co-constitutive. The novel’s depiction of brothels

as microcosms of state control—where women are taxed, surveilled, and commodified—mirrors broader economic exploitation: women’s labor is extracted while their personhood is negated.
