He highlights how figures like Earp were not anomalies but functional actors in a system where formal law lagged behind social and economic change. Minard stresses that Earp's actions must be judged not by modern standards but by the norms of his time—where personal honor, reputation, and community consensus often substituted for procedural legality. Yet Earp's mythos has obscured these nuances. Media coverage in the 1880s, particularly from rival newspapers like the *Tombstone Epitaph* and the *Phoenix Gazette*, amplified his image as a lone moral warrior, a narrative later reinforced by dime novels and Hollywood. As historian Richard Slotkin observed, such myth-making served a cultural purpose: it projected American ideals of rugged individualism onto a chaotic past, transforming a complex enforcer into a symbol of righteous order.
