The Malian NGO École sur Roulis (“School on Wheels”) reports that 83% of children in its network attend classes regularly despite seasonal displacement, a resilience rate surpassing formal schools in the same regions. Economically, the wayside school reflects a broader crisis of state capacity. In places where GDP per capita fails to support universal public services, communities innovate or outsource education.
