Conversely, in democratic societies, the genre serves as a counterweight—exposing hidden histories, amplifying marginalized voices, and fostering transnational empathy. The 2023 publication of **The Unseen Routes**, a collection of travel narratives from Syrian refugees and displaced communities, exemplifies this dynamic—offering a ground-level counter-narrative to official discourse. Looking ahead, the genre’s evolution will be shaped by intersecting crises: climate collapse, digital fragmentation, and rising nationalism.
