The Biden administration's focus on climate-biodiversity linkages and rejoining international accords signals renewed commitment, but deep institutional fragmentation persists. Emerging economies from Brazil to Indonesia navigate a different terrain. Their state laboratories are simultaneously custodians of megadiverse ecosystems and targets of external pressure to conform to global conservation standards. Brazil's Instituto Chico Mendes in Acre, for example, has pioneered community-based monitoring systems that integrate indigenous knowledge with scientific methods—a model increasingly recognized for its potential to bridge local and global needs. Yet, political volatility and funding instability threaten the sustainability of such innovations, exposing the fragility of state-lab relationships in politically volatile contexts.
