Aging infrastructure, combined with stringent emissions standards, has led to widespread refinery closures—particularly in Germany and France. This decline has increased import dependency, amplifying exposure to geopolitical disruptions, as seen during the 2022 energy crisis triggered by the war in Ukraine. The European Union’s push for fuel quality homogenization and carbon intensity targets further complicates operations, forcing refiners to invest

heavily in decarbonization technologies. In North America, the shale revolution reshaped refining economics. The surge in light, sweet crude from the Permian Basin lowered feedstock costs, enabling a wave of refinery upgrades and expansions. Beyond economics, refining embeds deep interdependencies. Refineries are energy-intensive, consuming significant electricity and steam, often sourced from local grids or dedicated cogeneration plants. They generate extensive wastewater and emissions, requiring costly treatment and compliance with tightening environmental regulations. The rise of carbon pricing and emissions trading systems—from the EU’s ETS to California’s Cap-and-Trade—has transformed pollution into a direct financial liability, pressuring refiners to adopt cleaner technologies or face escalating compliance costs.
