In Iran, where direct criticism invites imprisonment, reporters embed political commentary in satirical verses and idiomatic turns that appear innocuous to censors but carry explosive meaning for readers familiar with cultural context. The 2022 Mahsa Amini protests saw underground media circulate pun-laden slogans—“Zan, zendegi, zendegi azad” (Woman, life, freedom) twisted into ironic doubles—transforming a rallying cry into a linguistic bomb. In China, the state’s tight control over discourse has prompted a parallel evolution: state media employs carefully calibrated puns to reinforce ideological narratives, while independent voices deploy subversive wordplay in coded social media posts. The 2023 Hong Kong protests featured graffiti with puns like “Liberation through lockstep” (解放—*jiehang lu*), a play on “锁” (crackdown) and “解” (liberation), exemplifying how puns serve as both psychological armor and covert propaganda. These examples underscore a global pattern: puns thrive in environments where direct speech is dangerous, turning semantic ambiguity into strategic ambiguity.
