through algorithmic visibility as much as doctrinal authority. Critics, however, raised urgent concerns. Media scholars such as Dr. Karen Armstrong (not to be confused with the scholar) argued that Finley's fusion of apocalyptic urgency with geopolitical commentary risked fostering fatalism and political disengagement, discouraging civic participation in favor of passive expectation.
