The peristyle house of Pompeii extended this logic, blending interior garden courtyards with thermal comfort and visual rhythm, prefiguring later Mediterranean traditions. Medieval European homes were shaped by feudalism and defense. Timber-framed half-timbered houses with steep pitches and small windows served both structural resilience and protection against raids. Interior layouts were rigidly stratified—lord's chamber on upper floors, servants' quarters below—mirroring feudal order. Meanwhile, Islamic domestic architecture flourished with courtyard houses, such as those in Fez or Isfahan, where inward focus minimized exposure to the public realm, privacy was paramount, and water features created microclimates of cooling relief.
