In Kenya, mobile lending platforms use FLRAT-like stratification to expand credit to informal sector workers, using alternative data (e.g., mobile phone usage, utility payments) while auditing for gender and regional bias. These adaptations reflect a

broader paradigm shift: risk assessment is no longer a technical silo, but a frontline mechanism for advancing inclusive growth. Looking forward, the FLRAT stands at a crossroads. Advances in machine learning, particularly explainable AI (XAI) and causal inference methods, promise more nuanced fairness detection.
